



# Mission Ideation

At the Rotary South Asia Conference on Development and Co-operation held in Colombo, Sri Lanka in September 2011, Rotarians from India, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka came together and decided to work for development of the region in the areas of education, health and hygiene, trade and commerce, youth and sports, empowerment of women, etc.

Rotarians of the region again met at Kathmandu, Nepal in March 2012 and pledged to work together to bring Total Literacy in South Asia. At the Rotary South Asia Literacy Summit held in New Delhi in December, 2013, Rotarians of India resolved to form the Rotary India Literacy Mission (RILM) and implement its program “T-E-A-C-H” to achieve the literacy goals.

To create a formal legal entity that could plan, fund and implement various initiatives in the chosen fields, the Rotary South Asia Society for Development and Co-operation (RSAS) was registered in Mumbai as a society under the Societies Registration Act, 1861 on February 15, 2014. Other countries in the region like Bangladesh, Nepal and Pakistan have also taken steps to form similar national Literacy Missions and implement literacy programs with the same objectives.

This Society subsequently adopted the Rotary India Literacy Mission, its Committee Structure and the T-E-A-C-H program in March 2014, united by the Goal of Total Literacy and Quality Education.



# T-E-A-C-H *for Total Literacy And Quality Education In India*

Rotary In India through “Rotary India Literacy Mission” has embarked upon one of the most comprehensive programs on Total Literacy and Quality Education. This mission wishes to achieve the literacy goals through its comprehensive program called T-E-A-C-H: Teacher Support, E-Learning, Adult Literacy, Child Development & Happy Schools.

Each of these programs with specific focus, is inter-linked with the others in objective and content, accompanied with improvement in learning outcome of primary education and spread of adult literacy in various parts of the country.

Understanding the enormity of the task, we have decided to adopt, in implementing T-E-A-C-H, a strategy of meaningful co-operation with all stakeholders in the field, by forging strong partnerships with the Government, Corporate, National/ State specific Non-Governmental Organisations as well as international organisations working in various segments of this country wide endeavour.

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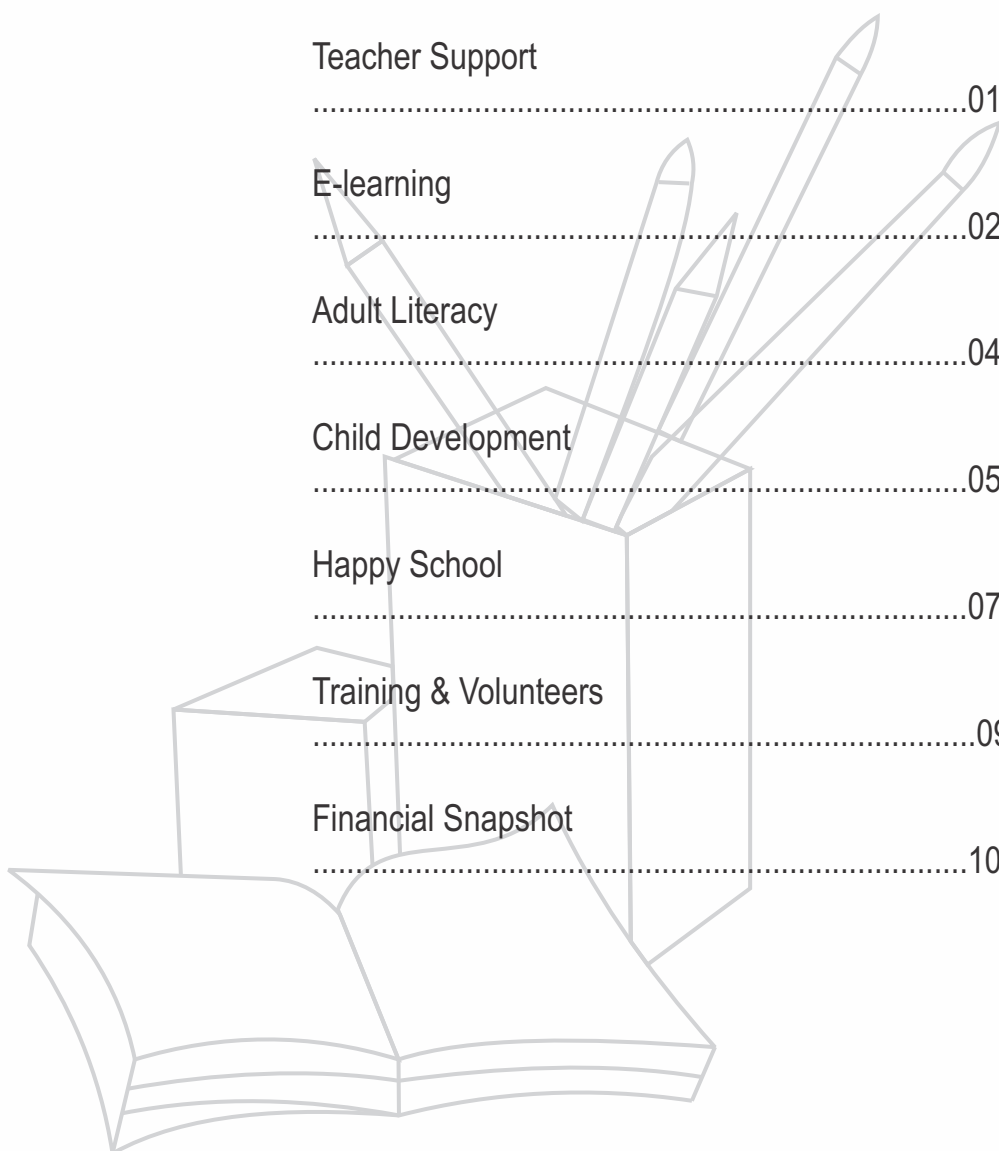
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## Message from the Chief Advisor:

The last year in the journey of Total Literacy has been amazing. The work that the Rotarians and Inner Wheel members have done and continue doing, across India in all aspects of T-E-A-C-H is indeed commendable. Each time we made a call for action, Rotary Clubs responded with enthusiasm and speed, be it for book collection, volunteer management or for Happy School project, Child Development or Adult Literacy.

Happy School Grant Application Forms have been uploaded and this will give a boost to the conversion of Happy Schools. Add to this the MoU signed with the Government of India under Swachh Bharat Abhiyan during the Chennai Institute and will now ensure that under the Happy School programme, Rotary clubs will construct toilet blocks in elementary schools.

We have signed a MoU with two organizations and are in the process of doing so with more, to send children to school under the Child Development Programme. This is very heartwarming programme where vulnerable children and those at risk are being sent or resented to schools. This entails counseling of parents, motivating the child, setting up an infrastructure. There is a lot that needs to be done and we will have to get personal involvement. The Child Development Programme provides an excellent opportunity for us to do hands-on service.

The funding of this programme is quite easy. It costs just Rs. 2,000/- to ensure that a child starts going to school after completion of all the above mentioned activities for about 3-4 months. I urge each and every one of you to not only participate in the programme but sponsor a child too. Rotarians across India can support one child each at a cost of only Rs. 2,000/-.

I would request Rotarians to also support the uploading of the projects that they do. While many clubs have already done this, I urge all others to do so too. It will take you 3-4 minutes to upload the project for information of RILM. Without this information we will neither be able to make headway with the government nor with the corporate world or other partners.

# Formulation of the T-E-A-C-H Program

The term “program” is used only for T-E-A-C-H. This includes five “projects”, namely, “T”, “E”, “A”, “C” and “H”. Each of these 5 projects has one or more “schemes”. Lastly, a scheme has several “activities”. Thus, the terminological hierarchy is: PROGRAM>>>PROJECT>>>SCHEME>>>ACTIVITY.

## Teacher Support

**This program aims to:**

- Improve the professional abilities and performance of teachers in selected Government/ Government aided schools.
- Train teachers in Government/ Government aided schools with better teaching aids, to enhance the learning outcomes.
- Impart supplemental teaching to students in selected using the services of volunteers.
- Strengthen District Institutes of Education & Training(DIET) in states.
- Recognition and Awards to outstanding teachers at the level of revenue Districts and below.

### Teacher Training:

Training teachers through Teacher Support vertical aims to improve the competency of teachers to improve competency of teachers. It focuses on developing core skills of teachers.

More than 800 Teachers have been trained across various geographical states in India and Rotary districts have taken great interest in training teachers with updated teaching aids.

### Supplemental Teaching:

More Volunteer teachers take up extra classes for students of various classes to help improve their academic performance.

# E-learning

Rotary India Literacy Mission's E-learning Program is all set to drive the E-Learning Revolution in Government and Government-Aided Primary Schools through a simple model comprised of projector/ television with interactive high quality audio-visual modules in local languages, mapped to respective State Board curriculum which not only benefits the student but aids the teacher as well.

This program aims to:

- Improve the quality of education through extensive use of local language curriculum based E-learning modules.
- Establish E-learning centres in selected elementary schools by equipping them with:
  - a) High quality E-learning modules in respective local languages, state-approved curricula.
  - b) Projector and power pack sets to each E-learning centre along with maintenance facility for 3 years.
- Train the Teachers in the usage of these devices.

The period October 2014 – January 2015 was marked by intense activities including Identification and short-listing of software vendors for the E-learning vertical.

After evaluation of e-learning software for school-level courses in various subjects and respective languages (including English), mapped according to the corresponding curricula of State Boards of Primary/Elementary/Secondary Education by a committee including school teachers as well as local Rotary leaders headed by the Chairman, RILM, three software vendors were short-listed in October 2014. Simultaneous enquiries for a compatible hardware (projector) led to identification of one vendor. The software and hardware vendors were asked to separately run the software modules on the hardware to verify compatibility without loss of quality of reproduction.

# Adult Literacy

This program aims to:

- Select adults (15+ years) non-literate person and imparting basic literacy to them by
- Qualified and trained volunteers
- Using available primers and E-learning modules wherever feasible
- Provide opportunities for continuing education to such neo-literates.
- Impart skill development training to adult neo-literates leveraging available government assistance.
- Set up of Adult Literacy Centres.

During mid-March 2015, a campaign titled 'Rotary India Global Dream – Leave No Adult Illiterate' was run with a view to enlisting school students as volunteers to teach and make illiterate adults literate during the summer vacations, using a set of 3 books (dealing with reading, writing and arithmetic) was developed and planned to be distributed among students who would handhold a senior to literacy.

In addition, five Rotary Clubs in Kolkata have come together to support 9 Adult Literacy Centres where 240 adults are being imparted literacy by volunteer teachers trained by the State Resource Centre for Adult Literacy, Kolkata and using the primers developed by the latter. A case study from one such centre in Daronda village where 30 illiterate Santhali housewives came forward to take part at an evening centre showed that these women found a social footing.

Further, discussions are in progress with the Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) to run adult literacy centres using the software developed by them. The progress will be effective in the next Literacy Year.

# Child Development

This program aims to:

- Provide education to differently abled/ at risk children and put them back to State-funded schools.
- Identify out-of-school children like children of convicts/ sex workers/ migrant workers, juvenile offenders, orphans, and so on.
- Community mobilisation on awareness of RTE Act.
- Provide supplemental teaching, counseling and mentoring through temporary classrooms.
- Organise and conduct learning ability evaluation of each child after 4 months.
- Monitor the progress of each child funded through a tracker on the T\_E\_A\_C\_H website.

The period October 2014 – January 2015 was marked by intense activities including entering into partnership (the first of its kind) with NISHTHA, a non-

governmental organisation (NGO) for mainstream schooling of 1,000 children at risk in villages of South 24 Parganas District of West Bengal, followed by another with Kamina Social Welfare Society, another NGO in Howrah District, West Bengal for education of 200 children of migrant brick kiln workers – both NGOs have started their work with 882 and 200 children.

During February 2015, preparatory non-formal education of 500 children of sex workers was started with a view to ensuring their admission to and retention in state-funded schools. Work has begun at Kolkata with about 40 children.

A centre has been started by Gloria Dayanand Seva Niketan in Shalimar with 100 children who live in slums adjacent to the terminal and are children of marginalised workers.

Teacher Training for teachers at Asha Kiran Centres are held at Rotary clubs to bring these teachers up to date with new Teacher Learning Materials and teaching techniques.

Along with field visits to ongoing centres, child screening visits were organised throughout the year to bring more children under the purview of the Asha Kiran centres to be run by partnering organisations.

# Happy School

## This program aims to:

- Select State-funded primary school that does not have the facilities mandated under the RTE Act.
- Provide/Upgrade the infrastructural and co-scholastic facilities in primary schools to make them secure, attractive and happy learning places for students and teachers to prevent drop outs.

## What makes a Happy School

- ii) Painted and well maintained school buildings,
- iii) Benches and desks for better student teacher interaction,
- iiii) Clean and hygienic separate toilets for boys and girls,
- iv) Safe and adequate drinking water for both children and teachers,
- v) Library facility for schools with more than 200 students,
- vi) Uniform and footwear for every child, and
- vii) Well maintained space for teaching staff

In Bengaluru, CREDAI has committed to fund conversion of 20 schools in that area to happy schools and discussions are on with Coca Cola India to similarly fund 300 schools.

More than 180 Schools have been adopted. Clubs like RC Ahmedabad Majesty, Gujarat and RC Siliguri Greens, West Bengal submitted reports of their activity. Rotary Club of Belur uploaded an online report of converting a school into HAPPY SCHOOL. Renovated and painted the building, repaired the roof, made toilets, upgraded play ground and library, and provided uniform to 50 school students at Karma Kutir at an expense of INR 270,000.

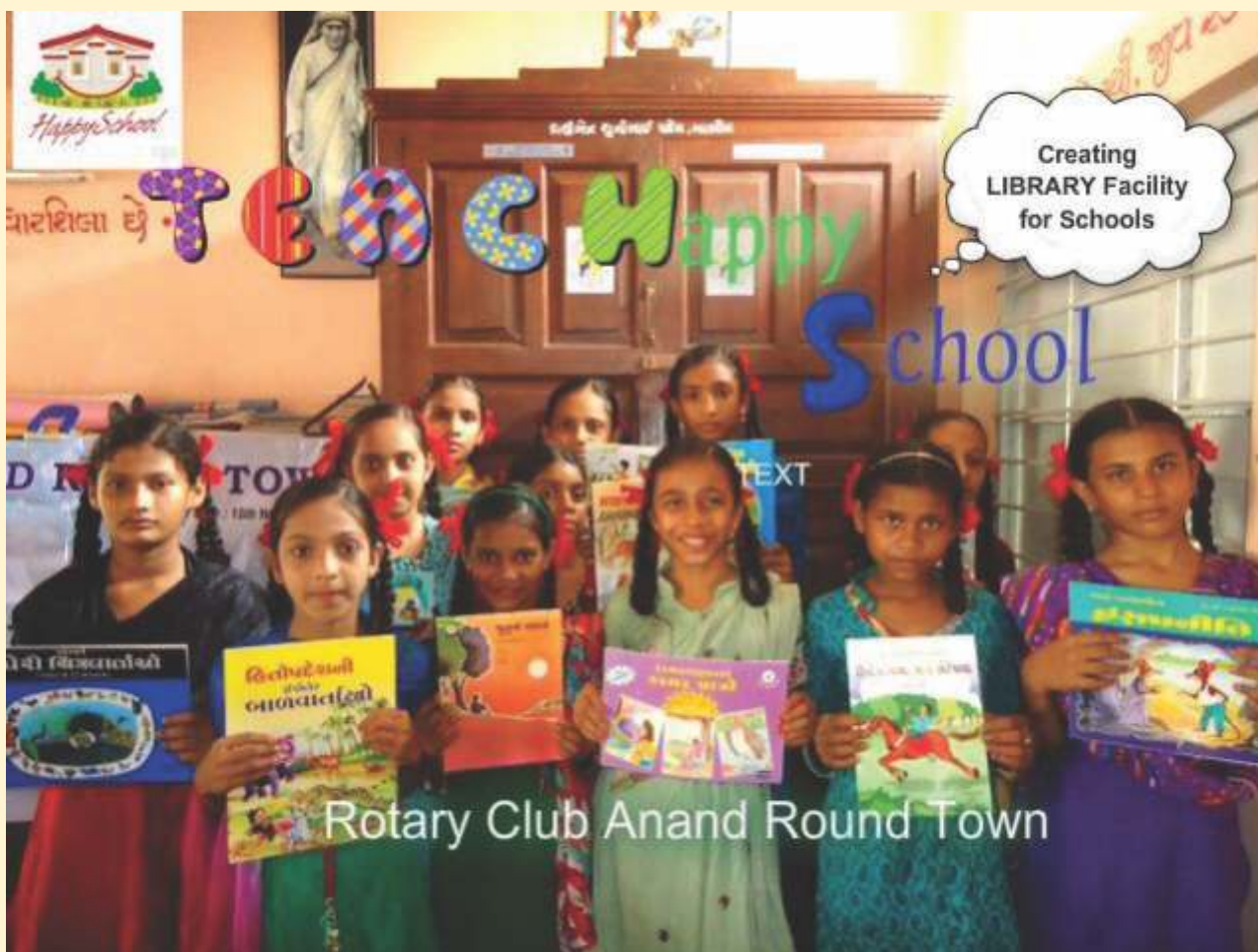

An innovative method titled “GROWBY” for sorting out the books and establishing classroom libraries was adopted from the Akshara Foundation and an attractive, step-by-step audio-visual presentation on the technique was developed and hosted on the website [www.rotaryteach.org](http://www.rotaryteach.org). According to information uploaded by Rotary Clubs on the website, 41 libraries have been set up so far in schools across India.

Between the first and second (August 2014, Mumbai) meetings of the EC, RILM planned and encouraged

the Rotary Clubs to implement a country-wide book collection drive titled 'A Million Books, A Million Smiles' that resulted in the collection of nearly 1.8 million books against the target of 1 million.

This was done with a view, first, to rolling out the T-E-A-C-H program simultaneously all over the country with a comparatively simple activity that could motivate and energise all Rotarians and, secondly, to using these books eventually to create libraries in schools.

## T raining

Training and Monitoring is an indispensable function to implement the T-E-A-C-H program, as there is necessity of some serious monitoring. Training is given to acquire new skills, sharpen existing ones, and perform better, increase productivity and to become better leaders. Since Rotary India Literacy Mission's team is comprised of experts from different fields, the organization has well-defined stages for training and monitoring of the volunteer force.

Trainings are organized to have a fruitful discussion over the T-E-A-C-H verticals, setting of goals for each, various roles and responsibilities which the volunteers need to carry out within their tenure. There are 5 tiers of training involving 8 levels of Rotary volunteers.

During July-August 2014, meetings of all national-level Committees and of Zonal Literacy Coordinators were held in Kolkata to brief them in detail on each vertical of the T-E-A-C-H program and various other matters like evaluation and awards, fund-raising, public relations and communications, training and volunteer management.

The Orientation Program for Rotary Year 2015-16 and Literacy Summit 2015, titled "IGNITE", were held with great success at Pune during 12-15 February 2015. All incoming District Governors (DGsE) and District Literacy Committee Chairs (DLCCs) as well as Zonal Literacy Coordinators and Members of various National level Committees were imparted training. The IGNITE program led to the DGsE fixing their District Goals for 2015-16 for all components of T-E-A-C-H as well as for various related activities.

The Inner Wheel Clubs and Rotaract Clubs in the country have agreed to participate in implementation

of T-E-A-C-H program. Separate Orientation meetings for training of the leaders of these organizations were held for this purpose and RILM spent funds to support them in this regard. Their goals for 2015-16 are awaited.

## V olunteers

The wholehearted participation in the first literacy initiative - A Million Books, A Million Smiles made it a grand success. Our target was a million books, but you have collected/donated far more than that.






During August-September, 2014, a countrywide campaign was launched to register volunteers who would like to work for the components of T-E-A-C-H and other functional areas. This was done on-line, via the website, so that the volunteer requirements of each RI District and the availability of volunteers with corresponding options and skill sets could be matched. The target for this drive (4,600 volunteers) was also exceeded with the registration of over 9,000 volunteers.


